At St John's we know how important it is for teachers and parents to work together to give your child the best start in education.

Reading together at home is one of the easiest but most important ways in which you can help your child.

Your child's reading diary plays an integral part of their home learning and forms a record of their reading habits and progress.

We ask that every child tries to read for at least 20 minutes per night.

Children from Year 3 upwards can write in their reading records themselves and this is checked by their class teacher 3 times a week. When we come together to do this, it is also an opportunity for children to recommend texts they are reading to their friends.
